Importance of Theory in Nursing

Nurses need to understand the concepts and theories that make up nursing. Otherwise, they won't be able to make quick decisions about patients when the situation calls for it.

Nursing theory focuses on four main <u>NRS 493 Benchmark Capstone Project Change</u> <u>Proposal</u> called metaparadigms: the person, environment, health and nursing. Lydia Hall created the Care, Cure, Core theory that focuses on these elements.

Definition

Theory is a framework that nursing professionals can use to make quick decisions about their patients. It helps them stay informed about the latest developments in the field of medicine and health care and can help them develop their skills. Nursing theories also provide a structure for nurses to understand the connections between different aspects of health and illness.

Nurses are expected to have knowledge of a broad range of theories to make the best decisions for their patients. These theories allow them to keep up with the <u>nrs</u> <u>493 capstone project change proposal presentation</u> research in their field and improve healthcare quality by implementing new practices. They also help them make decisions about how to treat their patients based on individual needs and circumstances.

Nursing theories are useful in describing nursing phenomena, explaining and predicting relationships among these phenomena, determining consequences, and prescribing actions (SPEEDY, 1989). They help to guide nursing practice and create a knowledge base for the discipline.

Scope

Nursing theories help nurses understand how different aspects of health and illness affect each other. They also serve as a basis for research and guide the treatment plans of nurses. Nurses of all levels must be familiar with the theories that underpin their practice.

Nursing theory is composed of a set of interrelated concepts and propositions that explain or describe a phenomenon. This concept can be a person, environment, or a situation. Nursing theory also defines the boundaries of a profession and can be used to define practice <u>NRS 493 Individual Success Plan</u>.

Theories that are descriptive or prescriptive have the most impact on nursing practice and patients. They are broad in scope and may require further clarification through research. Those that are more specific in nature are considered middle range and have a more narrow focus on particular patient populations and situations. They are more action-oriented than the grand nursing theories. They are used to provide frameworks for nursing interventions and predict the outcome of nursing practices (Walker and Avant, 1995).)..

Significance

Theories have an important role in nursing because they organize the field of nursing so that people can more easily understand what it is all about. They also provide a framework for analyzing and understanding nursing practice and can be used as guidelines for how nurses should act when they take care of patients.

Nursing theory often includes the four main concepts of person, environment, health, and nursing. These concepts are sometimes referred to as the <u>nrs 493 topic</u> <u>1 lopes activity tracker kr</u> of nursing.

Nursing theories can be categorized as either descriptive or prescriptive. Descriptive nursing theories describe and identify phenomena, while prescriptive nursing theories provide a framework for predicting consequences or the effect of an action. In addition to the two types of nursing theories, there are several sub-categories. For example, there are coping and stressor theories that divide the concept of health into five areas, and there are cultural care theories created by Madeleine Leininger that address the way patient's healthcare should be tailored to their culture and beliefs.

Applicability

Nursing theories help to shape and guide clinical practice. Nurses can use these theories to make decisions about patient care and treatment plans. These theories also serve as a framework for research. They are a valuable resource for nurses and nursing students.

It is important to note that some nursing theories are unique, while others are based on other disciplines. Theories that are considered unique nursing <u>NR501 Importance</u> <u>of Theory in Nursing</u> are those that delve into concepts specific to the discipline. These include domain, paradigm, and process. Theories that are based on other disciplines are called borrowed theories.

For example, a Jehovah's Witnesses patient may refuse a blood transfusion because they believe it is against their faith. In this case, the nurse would use Dorothea Orem's Self-Care theory to understand the patient's reasoning and respect their decision. This theory would help the nurse to understand how a patient's beliefs and values could affect their health outcomes. This would allow the nurse to create a more positive relationship with their patient and improve the patient's overall stress level.
